Building Code, as well as the process associated with obtaining a building permit in South Stormont, were presented by Hilton Cryderman, South Stormont Director of Building/Chief Building Officer and Deputy CBO Harry Hutchinson, with Troy Merriman, building technician, also present.

During his presentation, Cryderman mentioned how in 2016 there were 235 building permit applications, 234 permits 1,350 issued and inspections carried out in South Stormont. He explained the role of various people in the issuing of building permits as defined by the Ontario


A new Ontario Building Code is set to be released in either the fall of 2018 or spring of 2019 with a significant number of changes to the Code. These may include fire safety, structural integrity, accessibility as well as public health and safety concerns being addressed.

Hutchinson concluded his presentation with information on details that designers could include on the drawings which will assist the building inspector.

A question and answer period followed the presentations and people were encouraged to contact the municipal building department should more information be required.



the heritage-themed craft show provided shoppers with an opportunity to purchase products such as ironwork, knitting, leather work and primitive wood creations.


Mullin said this event is a way to say thank you the Dunvegan Recreation Association for all their assistance during the annual War of 1812 Re-enactment held at the Glengarry

Re: SD&G budget starts with a 2.6 per cent decrease

A recent Cornwall Newswatch story noted that the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas, and Glengarry will have a 15 per cent decrease from the provincial government this year due to cuts to the Ontario Municipal Partnership Fund, the main transfer payment from the province to municipalities. This is unfair and SD&G is not alone.

Since 2013, the current government cut \$70-million out of the Ontario Municipal Partnership Fund resulting in many municipalities being forced to increase property taxes or reduce services. The province needs to do their part.

We understand that municipalities like Stormont, Dundas, and Glengarry rely on the Ontario Municipal Partnership Fund grant so last weekend as part of our People's Guarantee we announced that a PC government would restore the \$70-million cut by the current government. This will help municipalities to deliver the services that people depend on.

Increasing the Ontario Municipal Partnership Fund is part of our commitment to be a partner that municipalities can depend on and address the affordability challenges that Ontario families are facing.

Party time

Harry Baker certainly upped the ante at our annual seasonal office party held at Russell Restaurant last Friday... he brought me a Christmas gift.

Harry being Harry, it was a gift with an unstated message, a set of three stubby, four-colour ballpoint pens. message: "Here. Now stop bugging me for a pencil during Russell Male Choir practices and when you're taking notes as a reporter."

Ironically – Does this qualify as irony? - I had a pen on me this time. I felt a little sheepish because I didn't get anything for Harry. He even bought lunch, a steak sandwich for him and a club sandwich for me. Had I known he was picking up the tab, I would have ordered steak too.

Harry and I started what has become a tradition four years ago after we looked around and noticed that many area offices were getting together for Christmas cheer but ours weren't. We decided to combine efforts and get in on the fun.

That gave us a Christmas celebration of exactly two, Harry and me, because each of our offices contains exactly one, Harry and me. It sure beats partying by yourself!

This time, Harry was dressed particularly festively, sporting a Santa hat and Christmas tie, because we had a choir gig at Russell Meadows right

after lunch. Being the more reserved of the two of us, I donned my seasonal accessories on the way to the gig rather than become the centre of attention in the restaurant as my companion chose to do.

Harry even stole the spotlight from Russell Township Mayor Pierre Leroux and wife Lynn who were lunching at a nearby table. Although we tried hard to eavesdrop, Mr. Mayor, no juicy bits came

During our party of two, Harry and I discuss many things, touching on family, the choir, municipal affairs, and future plans. However, one issue has dominated the get-together every year: the status of the Taggart Miller Environmental Services dump which the company prefers to call a recycling centre.

Since the facility was first announced seven years ago, Harry has been frontand-centre in the resistance campaign and I've covered it as a reporter and columnist. Early on, my interest took on a personal note because Taggart Miller's original location was in the quarry and surrounding acreage behind North Russell my farmhouse.

After the proponents were driven out of North Russell, they shifted to an equally sensitive site at the corner of Boundary and Devine roads in rural Ottawa where they were eventually successful in obtaining

approval. So, instead of getting a mega dump inside the township, we're poised to get one at the western gateway to the township. Lots of observers aren't sure which scenario is

Harry didn't just surprise me with a Christmas present. As president of the Citizens' Environmental Stewardship Association East of Ottawa, he also surprised me with his current stand on the dump which is far from capitulation.

He was particularly fired up because, along with about 150 others, he'd attended a Taggart Miller information session in Carlsbad Springs the evening before. Harry still thinks there's a chance the project could be blocked at the municipal level, starting with a meeting of Ottawa's Agriculture and Rural Affairs Committee in February.

Asunderlined by Russell's Dr. Gerry Heymans, the hot topic at the info session was the potential health threat posed to those who live close to the waste disposal plant. No broad human health impact study was required as part of the approval process; Taggart Miller examined the issue within 500 metres.

Between satisfying mouthfuls of steak - Do I ever wish I would have ordered the same! - Harry told me Taggart Miller should be required by the provincial city to look at the impact of pollutants travelling in water and the air at least 5 km beyond the boundaries of the site, and up to 12 pollutants for transported by prevailing

winds. The extended study

should be required as part

of an Official Plan

amendment.

In addition to the health impact, Harry emphasized that other important issues unresolved, remain including lack documented need for another huge facility to deal with Eastern Ontario institutional, commercial and industrial waste which is the Taggart Miller mandate; excess truck traffic in and out of the site and how to manage it; harmful impact on area farmland groundwater; toxic air quality; damage to ecosystems; and further loss

On his way out, the mayor stopped by our table and revealed that, despite the tremendous potential impact on our doorstep, there's no formal process in place to advise Russell Township of ongoing developments in the dump

of forest cover.

That's a lot to digest! Which leaves me with one burning question: What should I get Harry for Christmas next year?

I was usually tasked with making sure there was enough water in the tree holder to ensure it didn't become a fire hazard or lose too many of its needles before the big day.

There weren't too many presents

usually one or two per person, but I vividly recall the anticipation of opening those gifts bright and early Christmas morning, something that wasn't shared by my parents and older brothers.

Despite the excitement and anticipation of gift giving, the best part of Christmas Day for me was always when dinner was served. If I remember correctly we didn't often have a turkey because as Mother explained Daddy once had a pet turkey as a child that ended up on the supper table and he never ate turkey again after that meal.



A good place to grow

Top 6 tips for a fire-free Christmas

Between fragrant Christmas trees, garlands of twinkling lights and crackling wood fires, the holidays are definitely an enchanting time of year. However, it's important to be cautious with all those lavish decorations. To prevent house fires during this festive season, you'll have to do more than just test your smoke detectors. Follow these precautionary measures for a Christmas that's as safe as it is merry!



2. Place candles on a stable surface far from flammable items like curtains and wrapped gifts, and make sure they're kept out of your children's and pets' reach when lit.



Choose a freshly cut tree with healthy needles that don't easily fall out.

Make a bevel cut at the base of the trunk and secure the tree in a container

filled with two to three litres of water. Place the tree far from heat sources,

and water it every day so it doesn't dry out. Finally, take down your tree

after 14 days at the most, even if it still looks relatively healthy

3. Make sure that your decorations don't obstruct emergency exits, including doors and



4. Turn off all Christmas decorations before going to bed or leaving your home. Most importantly, never leave a lit candle unattended!



6. Keep the mantelpiece clear of flammable decorations (branches, stockings, etc.), and never burn wrapping paper or wood from your Christmas tree in the fireplace. Once ignited, these materials can become airborne and land on your roof or in your backyard.

1. Verify that your lights are in good

condition and suitable for outdoor use, when

applicable. Don't overload electrical circuits, and never run extension cords under carpets,

through doorways or in high-traffic areas.

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

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
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nbrun volunteer honoured with two major awards

EMBRUN - Marie-Claire Ivanski has been a resident of Embrun since 1974. Throughout those years, she has volunteered for small organizations to help with her children's hockey and Girl Guides. It was 12 years ago that her true volunteer work began.

After a close friend was diagnosed and died of breast cancer, Ivanski felt a spark light inside her. It began with fundraising for the Canadian Breast Cancer Foundation. Ivanski was part of a corporate team for five years and then after started her own team, called Friends for Life. "With the combined effort of these two teams, I've raised over \$600,000 for the Canadian Breast Cancer foundation," said Ivanski.

Alongside her work for the Canadian Breast Cancer Foundation, Ivanski's second biggest project is her work with Victoria's Quilts. An organization of quilters, about 50 strong, who make and deliver quilts to cancer patients in Russell, Embrun and surrounding areas. "This made me feel like I was giving more to the cancer community at large. I'm the distributor, and deliver to this area/district," said Ivanski, who stores the quilts in her home and coordinates recipients. "A lot of times I get to meet the cancer patients and go that extra mile whether they need a ride to an appointment or whatever they need that day."

Ivanski doesn't limit herself to these two projects, however. "We've done fundraising for the Sports Dome in Embrun, and any big causes, I like to get involved. Probably all together over the 12 years of fundraising I'll probably hit the million dollar mark this year," she explained.

Ivanski doesn't do her volunteering or fundraising for recognition. If anything, her biggest message and goal is to let people know that they are not alone. This exemplary empathy has not gone unnoticed.

In the past few weeks, Ivanski has been the recipient of two prestigious volunteer awards. The first was the J.P. St. Pierre Award, given to her during the United Counties Warden's Banquet on Dec. 2, and the second was the Canada Volunteer Award for Community Leader on Dec. 5. "I was just really in shock and both happened at once. [Volunteering is done without] expectations and then all of a sudden everyone is saying thank you in a big way, in a very humbling way," said Ivanski.

For the J.P. St. Pierre Award, Ivanski was invited to the banquet by a friend and sister of the award namesake. When she said she could not attend due to a prior engagement, she was persuaded to reconsider. "I was told I would probably want to reconsider because I had been nominated for the award and that I would be the recipient," explained Ivanski. "It was still an amazing shock. I had thought [J.P. St. Pierre] to be a very kind, giving man who shared and brought communities together by

doing so much for the municipality. To be mentioned alongside him was quite the honour to be thought of in that way. Especially since I knew him and to have that honour in his name it was more than words can describe."

For the Canada Volunteer Award, Ivanski knew about the nomination almost a year in advance. "In January, my friend Michelle nominated me for this Canada Volunteer Award. I heard in July that I was moving on to the next step and then one day the phone rang and they told me I was to be the recipient. Wow, that just knocked me off my feet," she said.

The CVA's have multiple divisions and five recipients in each division. Ivanski was one of those five for her division of Community Leadership. The award ceremony which was held at the Chateau Laurier, also featured a volunteer forum on the second day where Ivanski listened to speakers discuss the future of volunteering and best practices to get youth involved. She and the other winners were presented with a pin and certificate from Jean-Yves Duclos, Minister of Families, Children and Social Development.

It is no wonder than Ivanski was the recipient of such high honours, her volunteering career is one with few rivals. Even when faced with these awards, Ivanski still aims to bring awareness to her causes. "It brings me such joy and comfort knowing [the people we help] don't need to feel alone. That is what I want my message to be. I think we are all meant to meet when we need each other," said Ivanski.

The flame which was ignited 12 years ago can be seen and heard through her passion and determination to help and there are no signs of that flame dying out anytime soon.
