MORRISBURG - Amid the celebrations associated with Dominion Day on July 1, 1958 celebrating Canada's Confederation, many residents watched and waited along the Front in Stormont and Dundas counties as the final chapter in the creation of the St. Lawrence

Seaway was written. What was expected to be an immediate flooding of the now vacant land where once animals and plants grew, where generations of people lived and worked began as a trickle before becoming a rush of water changing forever the coastline and history of the area.

SDG celebrates Canada Day

SDG – Stormont Dundas and Glengarry counties celebrated Canada's 151st birthday in record breaking heat on Sun., July 1. Each of the villages organized spectacular shows for their residents with activities, food, fun and of course the always anticipated evening

The sweltering heat reduced the turnout at all the celebrations across the province. Canadian Heritage reported there were only 6,000 people on Parliament Hill during the noon performances, much less than the

expected turnout and last year's 25,000. Once the temperature gave way slightly during the evening, Canadian Heritage estimated over 19,000 people in total, had attended throughout the day.

In the local areas, splash pads and indoor activities, community centres and morning events made Canada Day a fun and safe day for everyone. In Avonmore the 5 km and 10 km Run to Get it Done were scheduled in the morning to help mitigate the risk of heat stress. Emergency services were also on-site just in case. Organizers reported 72 runners took part in the races.

In Morrisburg the splash pad was a big hit among kids looking to cool off, as were the shaded areas where bingo and other games made for an enjoyable day. There was another successful bike decorating contest with plenty of kids participating. The highlight of the day was of course the fireworks at dusk.

On the 60th anniversary of Inundation Day, as July 1 is also known, a small group of people gathered along the waterfront in Morrisburg to witness the unveiling of a plaque, entitled Morrisburg Then and Now. A press release issued by the Municipality of South Dundas, prior to the event, explained how "This sign is a pictorial reminder of what Morrisburg once was, and what was lost, and will mark an important historical focal point in the park."

Morrisburg resident John Gleed "designed, created and sponsored" the plaque which features an overlay of the 1954 Ontario Hydro map on a 2017 Google Earth image of this section of the community as well as information on the St. Lawrence Seaway and Power Project.

During the short ceremony, Gleed thanked of members the Morrisburg Waterfront Advisory Committee, council and staff of the municipality as well as the community supporters of the project.


Our generous donors helped the WMDH Foundation purchase 21 new pieces of medical equipment for patient care. \$816,854 was transferred to WDMH this

Le 4 mai 2018, le ministère de l'Environnement et de l'Action en matière de changement climatique a émis une autorisation de projet d'énergie renouvelable (APER) [0871-AV3TFM] à Nation Rise Wind Farm Limited Partnership pour la construction du parc éolien Nation Rise (le « Projet »). 

Nation Rise Wind Farm Limited Partnership has received a Renewable Energy Approval (REA) [0871-AV3TFM] from the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change on May 4, 2018 to develop the Nation Rise Wind Farm (the "Project"), a wholly-owned subsidiary of EDP Renewables Canada Ltd. The proposed Project has a total maximum nameplate capacity of approximately 100 MW and is located on private and public lands in the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry in the Township of North Stormont, Ontario.

Purpose of the Community Liaison Committee (CLC):

The Project will be forming a CLC in accordance with the Project's REA in order to exchange ideas, share interests, express concerns and provide updates about the Project with members of the public, Indigenous communities and other stakeholders during the construction and operation phases. Various aspects including, construction, installation, use, operation, maintenance and retirement of the Project will be discussed. A Terms of Reference will be created and agreed upon by the CLC members to structure the CLC meetings.

Participating in the CLC:

The CLC will consist of up to 12 participants selected to provide a broad and balanced perspective. CLC members will be encouraged to share any information from the CLC discussions with other interested community members. Each CLC member will be responsible for attending a minimum of 4 meetings over a two-year period. Meetings are expected to take place on weekday evenings in the Township of North Stormont, for approximately two hours each. The first CLC meeting is expected to take place in January - March 2019.

Individuals from the following groups, among others, are invited to participate:

- Landowners and residents within 1 km of the Project;
- Indigenous communities;
- Local municipality and conservation authority;
- Local social and environmental organizations
- Agricultural and business communities;
- Representatives from local agencies.

Membership of the CLC does not constitute support, endorsement, or opposition of the Project and potential members will not be selected with bias on this basis. CLC membership is a voluntary activity and its members will serve without remuneration.

Helping out the little guys

Homeless enumeration to take place across the counties

SDG – This summer, there will be a homelessness enumeration taking place in throughout Cornwall, Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry. The count will be undertaken as part of a provincial requirement, with the definition used to define homelessness being The Canadian Definition of Homelessness. This enumeration count will be conducted by the Housing Division of the Social and Housing Services Department.

Enumeration provides basic information that can: improve understanding of the extent of homelessness in communities and the characteristics, circumstances, and needs of those experiencing homelessness. It can strengthen the community's ability to support those experiencing homelessness, and inform community actions to prevent and reduce homelessness in communities.

Enumeration staff will complete surveys with individuals experiencing homelessness at

various service organizations and agencies (e.g. housing service providers, drop-in centres, meal programs) in each community. In addition, walking surveys of specific areas will also be conducted. Surveys, of individuals defined as homeless, will also be completed at the Social Housing Registry, during working hours throughout this time frame. This is known as the Period Prevalence Count method for enumerating homelessness.

Homeless enumeration is a count of the minimum number of people who are experiencing homelessness in a community over a specific period of time. Enumeration involves gathering information about the demographic characteristics, circumstances, and needs of those experiencing homelessness in the SDG communities.

Homelessness "describes the situation of an individual or family without stable, permanent,

appropriate housing, or the immediate prospect, means and ability of acquiring it." Enumeration will include three types of homelessness: unsheltered - those sleeping in public spaces or places not intended for human habitation because they have nowhere else to stay. Emergency sheltered – those who are accessing emergency shelters, including violence against women shelters, or hotel/motel beds in lieu of shelter beds. Provisionally accommodated those who are living in temporary accommodations with no guarantee that they can continue to stay there. This includes hidden homelessness (e.g. couch-surfing) and temporary rentals (e.g. motels, rooming houses). It also includes transitional housing and institutions (e.g. hospitals, residential treatment programs) where individuals may be discharged into a state of homelessness.

Eastern Ontario federal MPs voice strong support for cellular improvements

ONTARIO - The Eastern Ontario Regional Network (EORN) is pleased that all Members of Parliament representing the region, and from across party lines, have signed strong letters of support to the federal government to help fund proposed cell service improvements for the region.

EORN is proposing a \$213-million public-private partnership to improve both the reach and quality of cellular data services in rural eastern Ontario, which is essential for business investment, jobs and quality of life.

About one quarter of the area where there are homes, businesses or major roads in the region cannot access any cellular services. And many areas don't have enough capacity to meet growing demand for mobile broadband. These gaps are the result of market failure. A public-private partnership would reduce carriers' infrastructure costs, creating a stronger business case to improve services.

The project is seeking one-third of the funding from the federal government, one-third from the provincial government and one-third from mobile carriers. Municipal governments across the region have already approved and/or contributed funds for technical work needed for the project.

The incoming Ontario Government committed to the province's share of \$71-million during the election

In two separate letters, all MPs from the region are urging the federal government to provide its \$71-million share for the project.

"We would like to express our thanks to all of our federal representatives for their strong support for the project. EORN has a proven track record of delivering outstanding results in collaboration with the federal, provincial and municipal governments, and the private sector," EORN chair J. Murray Jones.

"We welcome this support from our MPs. The backing from across the political spectrum demonstrates just how important this cell project is for the future of our region. We are hopeful that the federal government will listen and fund this critical project," EOWC chair Robin Jones.

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


