FINCH – The past year was anything but dull for South Nation Conservation (SNC) as it continued to work closely with its municipalities, partners and residents to deliver programs, engage communities, expand its public natural spaces and offer greater recreational opportunities across its 4,384 square-kilometre jurisdiction in eastern Ontario.

Earlier this year, SNC announced that its recently acquired Oschmann Forest in North Dundas would become the new home of its popular Maple Syrup Education Program starting next spring. The Conservation Authority has been working to render the forest fit to demonstrate maple syrup production to local students in the new year for its 18th season.

SNC continued to empower local youth through a variety of educational programs such as their Stream of Dreams program that takes place at schools and its summer Youth Fishing Camps. Additionally, SNC unveiled its Community Lands Geopassport, guiding users through a real-life geocaching adventure within its Community Lands to learn more about the important benefits of forests. SNC's Conservation Areas are accessible free of charge and offer many recreational opportunities; over 80,000 people enjoyed SNC's Conservation Areas in 2018.

The past year also saw the Conservation Authority publish a report titled

Jurisdiction" following two years of consultation and review with local stakeholder working groups. SNC has begun implementing some recommendations from the report; work with municipalities will continue through 2019 to help municipalities meet new Municipal Act amendments for policies on local forest cover.

SNC planted over 127,000 trees across its jurisdiction in 2018, including the milestone achievement of the Conservation Authority's three millionth tree planted since 1990. Ash trees infected by the invasive Emerald Ash Borer were also removed and replaced in the City of Ottawa this year thanks to the Ash Tree Replacement Pilot Program, a partnership between SNC and the City of Ottawa.

Government announces new alcohol-impaired driving laws

OTTAWA – The Government of Canada has taken important steps to strengthen the criminal justice system to better protect Canadians from impaired driving.

On Dec. 4, during Safe Driving Week, the Minister of Justice and Attorney General of Canada reminded Canadians that changes to the laws relating to alcoholimpaired driving in the Criminal Code will take effect Dec. 18. These reforms build on the recent changes to strengthen the law of drug-impaired driving.

Importantly, the alcohol-impaired driving reforms will implement mandatory alcohol screening in Canada. Mandatory alcohol screening will authorize law enforcement to demand a breath sample at the roadside from any driver that has been lawfully stopped. This is a proven traffic safety measure that has had significant success in preventing road deaths in countries such as Australia and Ireland.

simplified, and comprehensive approach to transportation offences, including impaired driving. This area is one of the most litigated in the Criminal Code. The new legal framework will increase deterrence and the detection of impaired drivers, and simplify the investigation and proof of the impaired driving offences resulting in shorter trials and reduced delays.

Part One of the former Bill C-46 came into force on June 21 and was about drugimpaired driving. Part Two focuses on alcohol-impaired driving and will come into force Dec. 18.

"Impaired driving is the leading criminal cause of death and injury in Canada. Mandatory alcohol screening will save lives in our country, as it has in Ireland, New Zealand, Australia and other

Safe food for Canadians licences now available the SFCR until it expires, even if the date of expiry of the for food businesses

ONTARIO – Food business owners across Canada can now apply for a licence under the new Safe Food for Canadians Regulations by accessing the Canadian Food Inspection Agency's online portal. These regulations will protect Canadian families by making the food system even safer by focusing on prevention and allowing for faster removal of unsafe food from the marketplace.

Food business owners are encouraged to apply for a licence now in order to be ready when the regulations come into force on Jan. 15. A Safe Food for Canadians licence costs \$250. The licence will be valid for two years.

Depending on the food commodity, type of activity, associated risks and business size, compliance with some requirements will be necessary immediately on Jan. 15, while others will be phased in over the following 12 to 30 months.

Business owners are encouraged to consult the sectorspecific timelines on the Canadian Food Inspection Agency website to determine if and when new requirements apply to them.

Businesses that export food products as of Jan. 15, will now need a licence if they need to obtain either an export certificate or certificate of free sale.


The United States has recently made it a requirement for all Canadian businesses that ship food to the U.S. to meet their new food safety standards. The Safe Food for Canadians Regulations will permit Canadian food businesses to acquire a licence that demonstrates that they meet the requirements under the U.S. Foreign Supplier Verification Program so that they can continue trading with the U.S.

If a business currently has a registration or licence with the CFIA, that registration or licence will remain valid under renewed registration or licence occurs after Jan. 15, (provided there is a statement on it indicating that it is also a licence under the Safe Food for Canadians Act). Once expired, the business will be required to apply for a Safe Food for Canadians licence.

"These regulations will simplify and strengthen rules for food in Canada, whether produced here or imported into the country. By putting the emphasis on prevention and faster removal of unsafe foods from the marketplace, the new rules will build on Canada's world-class food safety system and go even further to protect Canadian families," said Ginette Petitpas Taylor, Minister of Health.

The Safe Food for Canadians Regulations will improve and strengthen Canada's food safety system, enable industry to innovate, and create greater market access opportunities for Canadian food products exported abroad.

"Maintaining and enhancing the quality of our exports is vital to achieving the Government of Canada's trade target of growing agriculture and food exports to \$85-billion by 2025. The Safe Food for Canadians Regulations are consistent with international food safety standards, and will further enhance Canada's food safety system while positioning food businesses to be more innovative and competitive, both at home and abroad," said Lawrence MacAulay, Minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food.
