

CHESTERVILLE – Carol Johnson, president of the Chesterville and District Agricultural Society, was pleased with the turnout at the society's annual general meeting held on Sun., Nov. 24. The potluck luncheon was held at the Dundas Federation of Agriculture's meeting room, located in the Nelson Laprade Centre in Chesterville.

Johnson said the society is off to a great start. "There are a lot of great ideas floating around and a lot of enthusiasm."

Planning is currently underway for an online fundraising auction and the 2020 Chesterville Fair is planned for the Aug. 28 to Aug. 30 weekend.

After lunch, Holly Byker from the Winchester Agricultural Research Station, spoke to the 16 people in attendance.

Johnson explained that the presentation centred on the uniqueness of our area and the importance of having "research relevant to our needs here in Eastern Ontario." She noted "it was also very encouraging to hear that not only do they have a summer student program" but also encourage local high school students to participate in the research. The research involves test plots and data collection.

The 2019/2020 CDAS board of directors will include 10 directors and six associate directors with Carol Johnson continuing as president and Ann Vanderlind as vice president. Kelsey Smith and Scott McLean will remain as interim secretary and treasurer until the positions are filled.

Johnson suggested contacting a board member or visiting chestervillefair.com if interested in volunteering with the CDAS.

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

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Letter

North Stormont under siege

Dear Editor:

Something has happened in North Stormont this past year and it's not good! As a North Stormont councillor, resident, taxpayer and community volunteer, I am very concerned and I think fellow residents should be very concerned as well.

A municipality is a corporation, with the people who govern it elected and responsible for the hiring of the chief administrative officer (CAO) who runs the operations of the township. Although the residents, the volunteers, the businesses and organizations are the heart and soul of a municipality, the corporation is the nuts and bolts that keep things operating, like our roads, snowplows and community centres.

A crisis is emerging in the municipality of North Stormont. While residents may not be aware of what's happening, it is now alarming enough to go public. It's a crisis of negativity that is preventing progress and creating stress and health issues for those under attack from a small circle, who are attempting to advance their own agendas in a destructive way.

Our previous township council voted to be an unwilling host for the Nation Rise Green Energy Project in 2015. That project is currently underway. In 2018, our long-time mayor Dennis Fife retired, and Jim Wert was acclaimed as mayor during the last municipal election. Craig Calder was hired as CAO a few months later.

The Nation Rise project has been divisive from the get-go. Combined with some other unrelated issues, it has created a perfect storm for negative dynamics.

One year into the term of the new council, we are seeing some vocal public opposition on a variety of files. This can result in loud, disruptive behaviour at North Stormont council meetings and other events, that I would describe as unrelenting, multi-faceted, personal, rude, negative and toxic. The behaviour is also evident via online postings created by unknown author(s) which attack various council members and staff. It's very challenging if you have a vision for positive and dynamic progress in our communities.

To be clear, opposition and contrary opinion are healthy things and necessary for constructive progress in any organization. I am not highlighting any single issue or any specific person in this opinion piece as there are many stakeholders with opposing views who are respectful and courteous in expressing their views. I am highlighting the negative and toxic effects of malicious opposition, and there is too much of it in North Stormont currently.

The toxic environment which is being created is taking a toll on the personal health of a number of councillors and staff. This is unacceptable. North Stormont's reputation and mantra of being "A Good Place to Grow" is in jeopardy.

I have a deep personal affection for the many great people and opportunities available in North Stormont. It would seem to some that the negative influences are currently "winning the day" despite being small in number. It is time for our quiet supporters to be heard before it is too late, so please make yourself known for the public record.

As a resident of North Stormont, you need to be aware of the situations presently occurring in this community. As a member of council and a resident of this community, I support both Mayor Jim Wert and CAO Craig Calder as they go about their duties.

Mayor Wert works to ensure the potential of this municipality is achieved. He listens with an empathetic ear to all, does his best to help anyone with any issues they are facing. In my opinion, it is unfortunate his initiation to the office of Mayor of North Stormont has been to preside over meetings where decorum is either ignored or not respected by some in attendance. CAO Craig Calder has just completed his first six months in his new position. He is a hard-working and honourable man who is dedicated to serving this municipality. Soon after he joined the township staff, negative forces began to emerge. I am ashamed of the version of North Stormont he has had to endure on an almost daily basis since assuming his position as CAO.

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

Days gone by – the McIntosh General Store, Ormond

ORMOND - The Lost Villages Historical Society is privileged to hold a generous collection of artifacts and photos. The group recently undertook a project to identify and catalog its treasures. It is a major task to put names and locations to slides and negatives, each showing a history not shared in recent years.

Two of those slides were particularly intriguing, and it was clear that they were not from any of the Lost Villages themselves; but there were clues, and with the help of many social media followers these photos were labeled. The two slides, likely from the 1950s, as they are coloured, show the McIntosh

General Store in Ormond, north of Winchester.

The store sat at the corner of Ormond Rd. and Rodney

Lane, in the Township of North Dundas. It was owned by Austin Carkner, followed by Harrison and Alice McIntosh. The property still exists today, a private home.

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
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Wave of support building for **Save Our Lake**

RUSSELL - Mayor Pierre Leroux earned a round of applause from a packed Russell Township council chambers Monday, when he declared support for conservation zoning at North Russell Quarry; if a new group is successful in acquiring it.

Called Save Our Lake, the group rapidly gaining traction. It was represented at the meeting by Candice Vetter with Marie Claire Ivanski delivering the proposal in French. The objective is to buy the quarry site, which over the vears has gradually transformed into a lake from Ottawa's Construction and preserve it for posterity.

Several years ago, the site was designated by Taggart Miller Environmental Services as a Dump: "It fits well with our preferred location of its main strategic objective of

proposed landfill and recycling centre. But the company was driven to a different site 4 km away by intense opposition from the Dump the Dump citizens committee, including Vetter; one of the main arguments put forward was the environmental sensitivity of the quarry.

The quarry site has remained idle ever since, with Taggart speculating it would make an attractive residential development someday. Leroux and Russell planning director Dominique Tremblay have specified the land is currently zoned for one use only...aggregate extraction.

Support for the Save Our Taggart Lake initiative has been coming from far and wide, including the Citizens' Environmental Stewardship Association-East of Ottawa which includes Dump the

habitat regeneration," said spokesman Harry Baker. "We're more than dump fighters... we're stewards of the environment."

Baker sees acquisition of the quarry as an opportunity to bring natural swimming back to the township, replacing former swimming holes in the Castor River.

He also envisions a large Russell brick monument at the site similar to Sudbury's Big Nickel. The quarry's red shale was the main ingredient of the township's regionally famous brickworks.

The

Oxford Action Environmental committee sent a letter of support describing what's becoming known as Quarry Lake as a key ecological feature: "We encourage you to embrace the excitement of putting Russell Township on the map as a pioneer in integrating community vision with enhanced quarry rehabilitation: Open water swimming, recreational

skating, bird watching, natural trails, interpretive history tours... accessible space wildlife and the community can all benefit from and enjoy."

Going even further, the Canadian Parks and Wilderness Society, Ottawa Valley Chapter, has offered to help acquire the property and apply for funding; executive director John McDonnell attended the

council meeting. Vetter also cited several other environmental organizations and service clubs getting on board the project.

"Habitat destruction of Quarry Lake and the land around it should never be allowed, not in any form," Vetter stated. "It holds groundwater in an aquifer that local residents and farms depend on. And the shale there is a provincially

protected resource."

Because the site is already protected, Vetter said a "pile of weight is added to the cause." Following the meeting, she expressed satisfaction with council's unofficial support. "The Community Concert Band played Christmas carols before the meeting. That put everyone in a good mood before we even started," she added.

EASTERN ONTARIO - The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) East Region Snowmobile, ATV, Vessel Enforcement (SAVE) team is reminding hunters and riders that safety needs to be their first priority.

There are a number of ways hunters can keep themselves, and those around them, safe. These include: telling someone where you will be hunting and when you will return; wearing hunter orange; handling firearms with care and attention at all times; never shooting unless you're sure of your target and what lies beyond; carrying a survival kit and a small first aid kit with you at all times; and never drinking alcohol while hunting.

As many hunters use ATVs and other off-road vehicles, the OPP SAVE team would like to encourage safe and responsible operation.

Exercise caution and ride within laws that are designed to keep you safe while operating any type of ORV. OPP investigations into ORV collisions continue to show that alcohol consumption, lack of experience, high speed, lack of helmet use and overall carelessness are major contributing factors in severe injuries or deaths associated with this outdoor activity.

Driving an ORV while impaired by alcohol or drugs is as unlawful as driving any other vehicle, and carries the same penalties as driving a motor vehicle while impaired by alcohol or drugs. Operators who do not wear their helmets are at a much higher risk of serious injury or death in the event of an ORV incident.
