

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
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Model train show a huge success

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



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

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Driving under the influence WILL EVER BE THE SAME AGAIN

Drinking responsibly over the holidays: what you should know

Car crashes are more common on Christmas and New Year's Eve than at any other time during the winter. Here are a few reminders that will help you celebrate the holidays safely.

Driving under the influence is risky

The dangers of driving while impaired are well known. According to Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD), over half of the fatal crashes that occur every year involve drivers who test positive for drugs or alcohol. Cannabis is detected roughly half the time that drugs are involved.

Whenever you get behind the wheel, you're responsible for the safety of the passengers in your vehicle. You're also obligated to those you share the road with. Though driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol may seem like a small matter, by doing so you're in fact risking many lives. Waiting for a cab or spending the night on a friend's couch may seem inconvenient, but it's a small price to pay to ensure everyone's safety, your own included.

How to get sober if you're impaired

Once you've consumed alcohol, it will remain in your bloodstream and affect your cognitive and motor functions for several hours, no matter how many cups of coffee you drink or how much food you eat. Indeed,

there's no quick way to get sober. Therefore, the best strategy is to simply sleep it off or call a cab, a designated driver service, or a friend or family member to take you home.

Ensure your friends get home safely

If you notice that a friend, colleague or family member is planning to drive even though they've had a few drinks, try to talk to them (possibly away from other guests so they don't feel attacked). Offer to call them a cab and, if they become confrontational, get someone to help you. If all else fails, you may need to call the police.

Driving under the influence of drugs and alcohol is risky but getting behind the wheel while tired or distracted can also cause road accidents. The Canadian Automobile Association reports that driver inattention is responsible for nearly 4 million crashes in North America every year.

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South Stormont approves 2020 budget

LONG SAULT – The 2020 budget for the municipality of South Stormont was presented to council by the director of finance/treasurer Cindy Piche during the Dec. 11 meeting and subsequently approved by council. Piche described a process which involved consultations and meetings to set objectives and goals for the municipality.

She noted there were many variables which needed to be considered, including MPAC property values, the consumer

price index and growth projections, as well as the effect of the United Counties tax levy and the education tax rate which are still undetermined.

A statement from the municipality says the budget "represents a balanced approach to the increasing service requirements as a result of aging infrastructure, increasing/changing service mandates, downloading of services and growth in the township." The approved budget, excluding water and wastewater services, allows the township to implement "a reasonable and affordable local tax rate increase

of 3.99 per cent, while proactively accomplishing tasks with a focus on the current and future needs within the township."

The purchase of a garbage truck and a fire truck are in the plans for 2020, as well as replacement of some arena and playground equipment.

Other key capital projects for South Stormont in 2020 include:

- Lakeside Drive;
- Dafoe Road reconstruction;
- North Lunenburg Road West culvert replacement;
- service delivery review; and
- development plans.

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








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Lots of fun as Lions celebrate Christmas

Cornwall fabricator adding 10 new jobs

CORNWALL - With help from the Ontario government's Regional Development Program, Olsonfab Metal Fabrication Ltd. of Cornwall is improving its new 52,000 square foot facility. The project will support optimal production flow and involve investing in new cranes.

Jim McDonell, member of provincial parliament for Stormont—Dundas—South Glengarry, announced in late November that Ontario is investing \$138,948 from the Eastern Ontario Development Fund to support Olsonfab's plans.

"Ontario's government is committed to the success of our regions," said MPP McDonell. "It's great to see Olsonfab invest in Cornwall, while creating jobs and strengthening the regional economy."

The expansion at Olsonfab will help increase





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Agronomist recommends farmers forget about 2019 crop season

CASSELMAN - Calling 2019 the most topsy-turvy crop year in his 30-year career, independent agronomist Gilles Quesnel cautioned members of the Russell County Soil & Crop Improvement Association against making any dramatic changes in their customary practices next sea-

The bizarre year is probably a fluke and doesn't represent a climate change trend, Quesnel emphasized. Climate change, he noted, is a gradual phenomenon not a one-hit wonder, which he suspects is the case for the write-off 2019 season. He told his listeners to just put it behind them.

A former provincial government field advisor, Quesnel was guest speaker at the Russell S&C annual meeting on Dec. 13, held upstairs in the Casselman Arena. About 25 members attended which was described as a typical turnout for the gathering featuring a financial report, summary from president Marc Quesnel, selection of directors, other presentations, and soup and sandwich lunch.

The financial statement showed a deficit of \$2350 on 2019 expenses of \$4030 which will be covered by \$1350 still due for this year and by reserves. The largest expense for 2019 was for a summer bus trip.

Several directors in the room were reappointed and a few who weren't in attendance were also named. For representation's sake, the county is

divided into four sectors with only one person attending from Russell Township which, said long-time member Robert Dessaint, doesn't participate in S&C at the level it once did.

Co-organizer of the annual Eastern Ontario Conference set for Kemptville Feb. 11, Gilles Quesnel said he's never seen anything like conflicting conditions marking the outgoing growing and harvest season... which, with a lot of corn still standing in the field, isn't quite over. However, reminded member Rejean Leclerc, it is time for crop producers to get their yield totals and support claims into Agricorp which administers risk management pro-

With members often agree-

ing, Quesnel described an overall decline in most crops, including up to 80 per cent mortality in alfalfa, because at various intervals it was too cold, too wet, too dry, or there were insufficient heat units. In the case of alfalfa, early shoots didn't survive unfavourable spring conditions and, similarly, winter wheat suffered a high kill rate.

For the first time that he can remember, there was significant difference in quality of corn planted early - May 10 and corn planted toward the end of May: "A producer mentioned that to me and I told him it was impossible. But it turned out to be the case."

Insufficient heat units and too much moisture extended corn and soybean harvest well beyond traditional early fall dates, resulting in the prevailing standing corn situation. Quesnel said he was surprised that much of it has stalks strong enough to continue supporting the plants.


The volunteers work as fundraising Friends of the Library, as outreach representatives, as board members, as

Looking for an alternative to brownies? These festive blondies are the perfect substitute.

Ingredients Blondie

- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 3/4 cup sweetened, shredded coconut
- 3/4 cup dried cranberries
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup white chocolate chips
- 1/3 cup butter
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

- 1 cup white chocolate chips
- 1 or 2 tablespoons milk

Directions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350 °F (175 °C).
- 2. Cover the bottom of an 8-inch square baking dish with parchment paper, letting the edges hang over the side.
- 3. In a bowl, combine the flour, coconut, cranberries, baking powder and salt.
- 4. In another bowl (this one should be microwave safe) place the white chocolate chips and butter and melt them in the microwave for about 30 seconds.
- 5. In the bowl of an electric mixer, beat the egg, brown sugar and vanilla on medium speed until the mixture has doubled in volume (about 3 minutes).
- 6. Add the white chocolate and butter mixture to the egg mixture and mix on slow speed. Slowly incorporate the dry
- 3. Completely coat each cheese stick in the flour, then the egg and then the breadcrumbs to create a crust. (This step can be repeated a second time for a crunchier result, but you'll have to double the breading ingredients.)
- 4. Place the mozzarella sticks on a baking sheet and freeze them for about 30 minutes.
- 5. Meanwhile, in a pot, heat the olive oil over low to medium heat. Add the French shallot and garlic and cook them until they start to turn golden.
- 6. Add the tomato sauce, tomato paste and maple syrup to the pot and let simmer for about 30 minutes or until the sauce thickens. Add the herbs and simmer for another 5 minutes. Add salt and pepper to taste.
- 7. In a large pan, heat the canola oil over medium heat. Fry the mozzarella sticks in batches until they're golden on both sides.
- 8. Serve while still warm with the dipping sauce on the side.

You can also cook the mozzarella sticks in the oven. To do so, heat it to 375 °F (190 °C) and place the cheese sticks on a baking sheet that's been covered with aluminum foil and lightly oiled. Spray a fine mist of olive oil over the breaded cheese and bake for 7 to 10 minutes or until golden brown.

Mozzarella sticks

- 1/4 cup flour
- 3/4 cup Italian breadcrumbs
- 500 grams mozzarella, cut into sticks about 15 millimetres thick
 - 2 tablespoons canola oil

Dipping sauce


- 1 teaspoon olive oil
- 1 clove garlic, finely chopped
- 1 French shallot, finely chopped
- 1 (398 millilitre) can tomato sauce
- 1 tablespoon tomato paste
- 1/2 cup maple syrup
- 1 teaspoon parsley, fresh or dry
- 1 teaspoon basil, fresh or dry
- Salt and pepper to taste

Directions

- 1. Spread the flour on one plate and the breadcrumbs on another.

- 7. Pour the batter into the baking dish and bake for 30 minutes or until a toothpick
 - 8. Let cool for about two hours.
- 9. To make the sauce, melt the white chocolate chips in the microwave (about 30 seconds) with 1 tablespoon of milk. If it's too thick, add another tablespoon of milk once the chocolate is melted.
- 10. Cut the blondies into squares or rectangles and serve with the sauce.
